The Connects events are still going very well. Thanks to all the Connects Committee for the time and effort they put in to make these events happen.



RICHARD HINTON, CLASSIC CARS

The event is aimed to allow car owners who own what they deem to be a "classic car" a reason to get it out of the garage and have an enjoyable drive around the greater Cannock Chase area in a loose informal convoy (Touring Assembly) as Covid0-19 restrictions ease. In the process allowing people on route to see cars pass through their location and raise funds for The Community Foundation for Staffordshire.

The event is organised Wolverhampton & South Staffordshire Car Club, using the public highway with a ceremonial start in Lichfield City.

The route includes a visit to Barr Beacon, Sutton Park, the National Memorial Arboretum (Mid-morning halt) and other points of interest on route finishing at Bishton Hall, Wolseley Bridge

By the 13th June the weather will be brighter and warmer. Start time for the first car is 09:00 arriving at the finish after 13:00 hours.

There was no Rotary Club of Lichfield St Chad "Cars in the Park" (Lichfield Beacon Park) in 2020 so as a pre cursor to the July 2021 event this is an opportunity for owners of 'E' Types, Ford Escort, Mini, Triumph, MG, TVR, Porsche, Morgans, Fiat, Lancia, Ferrari, Capri, Lamborghini etc. to dust off their steed and have a great day out.

The tour will be a Charity event with proceeds going to The Community Foundation in Staffordshire and their various local groups around the county. Cars start at 1-minute intervals traversing a three – four hour route that is dependent on how long you wish to stay at the points of interest (Passage Controls) on route.

There is a midmorning halt at the

National Memorial Arboretum to

stetch your legs, grab a drink and take in the atmosphere. All socially distanced with an entry fee under £40 per car. All you need is a car, a pen, and a passenger to read out the route from a simple road book that will be supplied along with an event decal to fix to your front windscreen. There are links below to videos on You tube of the Norwich Union Classic Car run from the 1990's to give you an idea of the sort of event proposed, you can see how relaxed the event would be with proper social distanced discipline. It would be a chance to get the cherished car out of the Garage for a day and have a drive on the road.

Down to you now"what if I didn't tell them....what if I didn't warn them."

Eight weeks on I feel fit as a fiddle now, 20lb lighter and well on the mend – so keep well.

PRESS RELEASE DOUBLE INITIATIVE PRAISED FOR SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS FOR MEN AGED OVER 40

A series of star-studded online meetings and the introduction of a 'Buddyline' service by one of the UK's largest organisations for men aged over 40 have been hailed as 'positive actions' to combat mental health.

41 Club, which has more than 13,500 members across the UK aged from 45 to over 100, has chosen Mental Health Awareness Week to shine a light on the proactive measures it has taken to ensure the welfare of its members during the pandemic.

Leading the way has been its weekly 41 Club Connects Zoom meetings which has provide a range of talks and activities for members. Amongst the star names to appear have been 'The Shepherdess' Amanda Owen, TV sports presenter John Inverdale, BBC cricket correspondent Jonathan Agnew, snooker duo Dennis Taylor and John Parrott and Emmerdale actor Dean Andrews.

The series, which has been provided free to members, has also included tours of Jaguar, cooking nights with Great British Menu chef Dave Critchley, tasting

events and a range of other talks on a wide range of subjects including the warder of Nelson Mandela and WWII veteran Norman Bartlett.

Since its launch, the 41 Club Connects events have attracted a combined total of 12,000 attendees in 26 countries, more than 18,000 Facebook views, with a further 2,000 watching on YouTube.

In addition, 41 Club, whose members are all former Round Tablers, also launched "Buddyline" - a call in service where "members could support members" on a totally confidential basis, for anyone feeling stressed or depressed or simply lonely and isolated.

41 Club National President Peter Good said: "41 Club wanted to demonstrate it is there to support its members - and the feedback from members has been overwhelmingly positive.

"Mental Health Awareness means addressing mental health issues - sometimes, but not always, by speaking about them, and other times by simply taking matters in hand to do something which addresses them.


"While the UK may now be coming out of lockdown, the last year has been challenging and we have members who are older, less mobile and alone. The 41 Club Connects meetings have provided an opportunity for people to come together and enjoy a shared and entertaining experience, while Buddyline has been there for those who needed someone to talk to.

"This has all been done voluntarily and the members of the 41 Club Connects team and the Buddyline volunteers have continued in the Round Table tradition of doing more for others."

The 41 Club Connects events are continuing and this week's guest is footballer John McGovern, who captained Nottingham Forest's European Cup Winning Team.



BERNARD ELWEN, NATIONAL SECRETARY

For the second year running, we have not been able to have a proper face-to-face AGM, so this year, National Council decided to hold a virtual one. This meant that the majority of the business normally conducted at an AGM could be done, without having a massive backlog at the next opportunity to meet.

It was decided to conduct the main part of the business as a Zoom webinar. The panellists would be National Board Members, along with Presidents of the Round Table family who were invited to bring greetings and say a few words. We were pleased to welcome 41 International President Luc Trigaux, Tangent President Tracey Pickin, Round Table President Matt Eaton and Ladies Circle President Michelle Chapman.

Each club was invited to register a voting delegate, in the same way as a normal AGM. Things became a bit more awkward with a number of delegates voting for more than one club. At a normal AGM, such delegates just put more than one card in the air for their multiple votes to count. With a Zoom webinar, the polling facility will only allow one vote per delegate, so those voting for more than one club were required to use the Chat facility in Zoom, and the tellers would add these to the polling results.

Things became a bit more complicated again when a handful of people who were not voting delegates decided to vote anyway. This was particularly awkward when one of the resolutions (Resolution 2 on canvassing) failed narrowly to achieve the two thirds majority to be approved. It was necessary for me on the following day to download the polling results as a spreadsheet and the chatbox transcript.

Analysis of this data against the registered voting delegates showed up that a handful had voted for the resolution when they shouldn't have done, and one delegate voting for two clubs had been recorded as if he was voting for one club with a double-barrelled name. After correcting this, I was able to inform National Council and the proposer of the resolution that the final figure was even further way from the two thirds majority required.

However, I am pleased to report that the other four resolutions were much more straightforward.

Resolution 1 – New rule 17.5 to remove proxy election voting. This was carried.

Resolution 2 – Deletion of rule 6.6 (Canvassing). This was narrowly defeated.

Resolution 3 – Amend rule 6.5 to require all candidates for National Board posts to have served as a member of National Council for a minimum of two years. This was carried.

Resolution 4 – Sharing of Conference costs with Tangent. This was carried.

Resolution 5 – Amendment of rule 6.2 regarding terms of office of National Council members. This was carried.

There was a total of 177 voting delegates registered, with a further 62 attendees who just wanted to log in to see what was happening. All attendees were invited to register from the Zoom invitation link, and all received (or should have received) an automated acknowledgement containing the link to log on and attend. It became apparent that several members had not received their confirmation, and I have no explanation as to why those who were approved to attend failed to receive their message. I expect some had been blocked by spam filters and company firewalls.

There were contested elections for two positions, these being National Vice President and National councillors' Liaison Officer. The National Vice President post had three candidates, and so it was necessary to have a system which would allow for instant run-off voting, which is what we call single transferable voting.

This worked well, with 185 ballots cast for the Vice President and 175 for the NCLO. Each of the five candidates submitted a video of the required length, and these were shown as part of the meeting.

Delegates were able to speak on a subject, once they had signalled their intention to speak in the Q&A facility in Zoom, and they had been unmuted by a technical assistant at the point they were invited to speak. It would have helped if all those speaking had remembered to give their name and club. My colleague John Kilshaw (National Councillor for Region 8) has put together a questionnaire for those who attended. The conclusions from this will be included in a future edition of the newsletter.

I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible at the Big Weekend, which will take place on 1st and 2nd October in Nottingham. This will include a Special General Meeting on Saturday 2nd October, with more details to be circulated nearer the time.





"NEVER CRY OVER SPILT MILK... IT COULD'VE BEEN WHISKY" - MAVERICK

CRY GOD FOR HARRY, ENGLAND, AND SAINT GEORGE!" (AND OTHER DISTILLERIES)

So you think England can't make whisky? Well, there are records of whisky making in England stretching back to at least the mid-18th century and word is that it existed in Chaucer's day. When the country's last distillery, London's Lea Valley, closed in 1903 it sounded the death knell for English whisky – until a few years ago.

After a dry spell lasting for more than a century, the last decade has seen a boom in English distillers right across the country. It was in 2006 that the renaissance truly began, when The English Whisky Company opened its St George Distillery in Norfolk - the first distillery in England for 120 years. Much research and the exploration of several different concepts ensued, including a micro-distillery. They persuaded Laphroaig distiller lain Henderson out of his planned retirement to help get them going, and by December 2006 made their first 29 barrels – and the foundation of a new generation of English Whisky.

Fast forward to today when there are now around 33 distilleries across Blighty producing or planning to produce whisky... what Scotland and Ireland (and Wales) can do, it seems that England can also do – with some delicious resuts.

So, if you are tempted to sample a we dram of English Water of Life, here are four I have tasted and can recommend.



THE WHISKY APPRECIATION GROUP

The English - Smokey Virgin Oak Cask - 46% ABV (~£52)

From the first English Distillery opened in 2006, as the name suggests, this Smokey Virgin Oak Cask expression was matured in virgin oak casks.



Nose: Rich bonfire smoke, with a touch of oak spice, blueberry loaf cake and vanilla

Palate: Medjool dates, caramelised nuts and burnt toast, with lots of wood smoke in support alongside milk chocolate

Finish: A drizzle of honey and dry smoke, with oily citrus peel

Filey Bay Flagship - 46% ABV (~£50)

From Yorkshire's first ever single malt whisky distillery near the village of Hunmanby on the coast, where all the barley used is grown on family farm and the family is in control of every stage of the growing and distilling process from choosing the variety of barley and how it is grown, right

hrough to bottling at the distillery. Very few other distilleries in the UK can claim this and it's something they're exceptionally proud of.

Nose: Peach, apricot, buttered crackers and a hint of mint leaf Palate: Chocolate chip cookies, maple syrup, barley, more peach, honeycomb and walnut Finish: Gingerbread, orange peel, very slightly floral



Adnams Triple Malt Whisky - 47% ABV (~£34)

From the first brewery / distillery (a bristillery?!) in England and where beer has been brewed for 670 years. Built in 2010, the Copper House Distillery sits within the Adnams brewery in Southwold, Suffolk. This whisky is produced using a trio of malted grains -barley, wheat and oats. It's then allowed to mature in new American oak casks for five years.

Nose: Complex, notes of spice, coconut and toasted oak, citrus fruit and sweet honey

Palate: Continued chocolatey elements, with a touch of bubble gum and charred oak

Finish: Long, satisfying

Steel Bonnets - 46.6% ABV (~£43)

From the Lakes Distillery, a renovated old Victorian model farm surrounded by the stunning Cumbrian hills, next to the River Derwent. This whisky is the first cross-border blend of exceptional English and Scotch malt whiskies



and has been produced to honour the memory of those people who lived in the Border Marches of England and Scotland during the 13th – 17th centuries.

Nose: Notes of vanilla, sweet spice & woodsmoke

Palate: Creamy, nutty & full-bodied; Vanilla, ginger, nutmeg, woodsmoke

Finish: Long & warming


